



## The history of flying geese

Flying geese blocks are seen in quilts dating back to the 19<sup>th</sup> century.









# Flying geese can be used as components of a quilt block.

Flying geese may be hidden within a block design.






## Flying Geese in Modern Quilts

Flying geese have been used extensively in modern quilting.






Many "flying geese" quilts use HST's in disguise. Although they are beautiful, they are not traditional flying geese.







# Anatomy of the Goose

Flying geese consist of 3 triangles; 1 goose and 2 sky. In order to accurately depict geese within the block it is recommended to select contrasting fabrics. Light goose with dark sky, or dark goose with light sky.






#### Geese using 3 fabrics.





Geese using more than just 3 fabrics.






#### **Construction Methods**


There are different 7 methods to construct flying geese

- 1. Using 3 Triangles
- 2. Single FG unit, 1 rectangle + 2 squares (bmqg tutorial)
- 3. No Waste 4 FG, 5 squares (bmqg tutorial)
- 4. 4 FG, 2 squares (connecting threads)
- 5. Dimensional 1 Seam, 1 rectangle + 2 squares (<u>connecting</u> <u>threads</u>)
- 6. Paper piecing
- 7. Wonky or Improv
